He reminded me of the earlier plan to do it as home schooling, so I have decided that beginning in September, the weeks that Flock #3 is to handle fellowship, we will not have Sunday School unless a substitute teacher offers to cover those weeks.

Food for thought...

The Israelites' pre-flight meal consisted of a fire-roasted sacrificial lamb with bitter herbs & unleavened bread. They were to eat the meal standing, cloaks & sandals on, staffs in hand, ready to flee. The foods of the Seder tell the Passover story:

Roasted shank bone recalls the lamb-on-the-run; vegetables dipped in salt water represent the Israelites' tears during years of enslavement; bitter herbs like horseradish or chicory symbolize their harsh servitude; fruit-and-nut mixtures represent the mortar used to construct buildings in Egypt; hard-boiled eggs are symbols of renewal & rebirth, but also are traditionally the food of mourners & are eaten in memory of

the two lost temples in Jerusalem; matzoh, an unleavened bread, is included because the fleeing Israelites had no time to let their bread rise. (From April 2016 Guideposts article)

Dogwood Legend

An old & beautiful legend has it that at the time of the crucifixion, the dogwood was comparable in size to the oak tree & other monarchs of the forest. Because of its firmness & strength, it was selected as the timber for the cross, but to be put to such a cruel use greatly distressed the tree. Sensing this, the crucified Jesus, in His gentle pity for the sorrow & suffering of all, said to it:

"Because of your sorrow & pity for my sufferings, never again will the dogwood tree grow large enough to be used as a gibbet. Henceforth, it will be slender, bent & twisted. Its blossoms will be in the form of a cross: two long & two short petals. In the center of the outer reach of each petal there will be nail prints, brown with rust & stained with red. In the center of the flower will be the crown of thorns & all who see this will remember."
