PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Advent is about to begin, along with the beginning of the new church year. We, at South China Community Church, use the Three-Year Lectionary. Most of the large main line denominations use the three-year division of biblical lessons. This makes sure that each pastor preaches on most of the major religious lessons at least once every three years.



This also means that the pastor of a certain church must preach on <u>all</u> subjects whether he wishes to or not. This keeps each of us from just concentrating on the lessons that we like to dwell. We need

to preach on those subjects we wish to avoid.

We all need to work on teachings that are hard for us to understand. It's easy for all of us to avoid those topics that challenge us. When a church goes astray it is because a pastor avoids preaching on topics he or she doesn't like. After that happens, they usually concentrate only on topics that push a certain belief. This is how cults begin.

It is the same for our personal lives. If we only care about certain topics & teachings of Jesus, we will end up leading ourselves astray. We end up devaluing the topics that challenge us. These are the lessons we need most of all. This year, let's challenge ourselves to address those topics that we need to work on most. - God's love and mine, Pastor Paul

President's Report:

In addition to the monthly reports by each Committee Chair, we continue reviewing the By-Laws & should have this completed before year-end for your review & comments.

As suggested at the Annual Meeting, we started the preliminary budget review in September so the Finance Officer could present it to the congregation in October. The budget as presented, with any suggestions from the congregation, was reviewed for changes at the November 12th Council meeting; the Finance Officer is preparing our annual Pledge Letter for mailing to the

congregation. Your prompt return of pledges will enable us to have more accurate income information for the final review of the draft



budget at the December 10th Council meeting. The revised budget will be forwarded to the congregation in December & voted upon at our January 2020 Annual Meeting.

Our major fund-raising events for 2019 have been held & proven very successful, although we continue to have less budgeted revenue coming in than our budgeted expenses. Your support of these events & the dedicated work of the various participants is greatly appreciated.

Building & Grounds:

November ...

the time of year when things are buttoned down, prepared for Maine's greatest season -- snow!

Outside, the building is doing well. The ramp & porch are painted. Shovel, sand & snow melt are in place, ready for use. The railing on the ramp is in need of a paint touch-up before the snow season starts, weather & time permitting. Removing the dying tree in front of the church is an excellent winter project, as snow will help protect the ground when the taken down tree is in sections.

Inside, the building is in good shape. Timers for heat to automatically go on & off are functioning well. Downstairs, the disused "pink" room will be transformed into a functional place for crafts to be created & stored, which will remove some of the obvious temporary storage upstairs & free up the stage.

The drop ceiling in Memorial Hall has been a bit of an eyesore as we have fixed & re-fixed the leak in the roof. Several times I thought we had dealt with the problem only to find at the next big rain that we had not. I am confident that all aspects of that leak are now dealt with, so the process of repairing the ceiling will begin.

The drop ceiling will be removed & the existing lights will be replaced with LED fixtures (like the ones in the kitchen); they will be mounted on the ceiling above the existing drop ceiling. The ceiling above will be stabilized (right now it is plaster & in need of attention) & will be transformed with a finish covering of ceiling panels & paint. The finished effect will raise the ceiling about 2' higher than the present one, making the room seem bigger & brighter. Thank you for your patience with the process; it has been a longer timeframe than I wanted.

Worship Committee:

The beginning of a new year is at hand – a new church year, that is. Our church year begins with Advent, starting December 1 this year. At our church, we follow the Revised Common Lectionary, with prescribed readings for each Sunday. It runs in three-year cycles; the Gospel readings in the first year (Year A) are taken from the Gospel of Matthew, those in the second year (Year B) from the Gospel of Mark, & those in the third year (Year C) from the Gospel of Luke. We are just finishing Year C of the cycle & will be starting Year A at the beginning of Advent.

In December, I will be distributing the list of Scripture readers for January-June of 2020. Many thanks to all who participate in this service! You have all been great at covering your turn or finding a substitute & that is very much appreciated. We currently have 11-12 people who participate. Please let me know if you would like to be added to the schedule or if you do not want to continue to participate.

There is a huge variety of worship music available to us – traditional, contemporary, everything in between – & everyone has favorites. As Pastor Paul has said, our service is traditional & primarily our hymns are also. However, there is certainly room for inclusion of a variety of types of music. We are looking for ways to include more contemporary music & are considering adding an occasional 4th hymn, having a special pre-service music time, or perhaps even adding a separate

service. What path to take is still being discussed; we may use a combination of your suggestions. If you have a hymn you would like the congregation to sing, please let me know. Keep in mind that we cannot reproduce copyrighted music, but many hymns are in the Public Domain or have never been copyrighted. - In Christian Love, Cheryl Baker, Elder of Worship



Finance & Stewardship:

Happy Thanksgiving, Merry Christmas & as always, thank you all for your generous financial support of SCCC!

Thus far, 2019 has been relatively good for our church finances. Our offerings shortfall has remained at a relatively constant pace since the last newsletter update in August. Total offerings at the end of October were \$42,749, which is \$3,481 less than the budgeted amount for this time of the year. Total revenue to date is \$57,164, which includes the one-time February donation of \$2,000. Total expenditures to date are \$57,264 for a total year-to-date deficit of just \$100. Were it not for the \$2,000 windfall in February, the deficit to date would be \$2,100.

The Church Council submitted a proposed draft 2020 budget to the congregation; we welcome any comments, questions or suggestions. The budget includes a projected short-



fall of approximately \$9,000 for next year. The annual pledge letter has been distributed & we ask those who are able to increase their pledge over their 2019 amount to do so & help close the projected budget gap. We also ask folks to come up with ideas for increasing our revenue.

Our 2020 budget contains an increase in expenditures of about 9% over 2019. The bulk of this increase is for maintenance & operation of our church building.

The 12 Days of Christmas



Originally a poem written by Catholic clerics, it was transformed into a carol when the "12 Days of Christmas" was holiday custom. If we look at the meaning the clerics chose for the 12 days, the impact of

this tradition can be understood & appreciated.

The "true love" in the song **is** not a sweetheart, but the Catholic Church's code for **God**. The person receiving the gifts is anyone who has accepted Christ as the Son of God & as Savior.

On the first day of Christmas my true love gave to me... a partridge in a pear tree.

The partridge represents Jesus. Christ is symbolically presented as a mother partridge, the only bird that will die to protect its young.

On the second day of Christmas my true love gave to me . . . two turtledoves.

These twin birds represent the Old & New Testaments. Through this gift, we find the complete story of Judeo-Christian faith & God's plan for the world.

On the third day of Christmas my true love gave to me . . . three French hens.

These birds represent faith, hope, & love. This gift hearkens back to 1 Corinthians 13, the love chapter written by the apostle Paul.

On the fourth day of Christmas my true love gave to me . . . four calling birds.

The four calling birds are the four Gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke, & John.



On the fifth day of Christmas my true love gave to me... five gold rings.

The gift of the **rings represents the first five books of the Old Testament**, known as the Torah or the Pentateuch.

On the sixth day of Christmas my true love gave to me... six geese a-laying.

Each egg is a day in creation, a time when the world was "hatched" or formed by God.

On the seventh day of Christmas my true love gave to me... seven swans a-swimming.

The seven gifts of the Holy Spirit are prophecy, ministry, teaching, exhortation, giving, leading, & compassion. As swans are one of the most beautiful & graceful creatures on earth, they seem to be a perfect symbol for the spiritual gifts.

On the eighth day of Christmas my true love gave to me... eight maids a-milking.

Being a milkmaid was about the worst job one could have in England during this period; this conveyed that Jesus cared as much about servants as he did those of royal blood. The eight who were blessed included the poor in spirit, those who mourn, the meek, those who hunger & thirst for righteousness, the merciful, the pure in heart, the peacemakers, & those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake.

On the ninth day of Christmas my true love gave



to me... nine ladies dancing. These nine dancers were the gifts known as the fruit of the Spirit. The fruits are love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, & self-control.

On the tenth day of Christmas my true love gave to me . . . ten lords a-leaping.

As **lords were** judges & in charge of the law, this code for **the Ten Commandments** was fairly straightforward to Catholics.

On the eleventh day of Christmas my true love gave to me... eleven pipers piping.

Most think of the disciples in terms of a dozen, but when Judas betrayed Jesus & committed suicide, there were only **eleven men** who **carried out the gospel message**.

On the twelfth day of Christmas my true love aave to me . . . twelve drummers drummina. The drummers are the twelve points of doctrine in the Apostles' Creed. "I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth. I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended into hell. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting."

History Behind "The 12 Days of Christmas"

Teaching the Catholic faith was outlawed in 16th century England; thus, the church went underground. To hide the important & illegal elements of their teaching, clerics composed poems that seemed silly to most people, but these verses were veiled works that taught the church's most important tenets. "The 12 Days of Christmas" is said to be one of these teaching tools.

Most people today believe that the 12 Days of Christmas start December 12th or 13th & run through Christmas Eve or Christmas Day. In fact, the first day of Christmas is December 25th and the final day is January 5th. For hundreds of years the Christmas holidays didn't begin until Christmas Eve & didn't end until Epiphany.
