CHURCH COUNCIL NEWS

President's Report:

Our in-person meetings, with masks and social distancing, continue to be held on the second Tuesday of each month at 6PM. As always, if you have any comments or concerns, you are welcome to attend, call me at (207) 861-4134 or e-mail me at gbj@roadrunnder.com.



As mentioned in the August newsletter, the proposed change to the by-laws was approved by the Council and, in an effort to save postage, will be

forwarded to the congregation along with the November pledge letter from the Financial Officer.

You have already received the Proposed 2021 Preliminary Budget to guide you with the projected needs of the church when

completing your 2021 pledge. Any suggested changes to the proposed budget were to be submitted to John Glowa or me prior to our November 10th Council meeting at which time we would have our final budget discussions before John sends out the pledge letters.

The Mission Statement on our website was outdated, so it was revised and has been approved by the Council. It is now posted on the website and Council members have a copy in their notebooks.

A matter of allowing individuals to get water from the church's outside tap was recently addressed. After much email discussion, it was voted that the church should not take on the liability of providing drinking water to individuals.

A new opportunity for our church to perform a public service to the community has just occurred. The Thurston Park Committee can no longer meet at the Town Office as they have too many attending to meet the Covid guidelines. The Committee Chairman asked Ron Maxwell if they could meet monthly in our building. Since Ron is a Committee member and will be at the meetings, and group meets the communitysponsored use of the building, the Council approved this request via email.

As you know, all church social gatherings have been cancelled and we were not able to have most of our fundraisers this year. That hurt us not only financially, but also

socially, as we did not get to see special friends who attend such events. The two drivethru barbecues were well attended, many thanks to all who participated. Something to think

about: Sheldon has advanced the idea of having more barbecues next summer if we

find we can't resume some of our other fundraisers.

As most of you know, we resumed inperson church services in Memorial Hall on June 7, with masks and social distancing by person/family. As of last week, our attendance has ranged from a low of 19 to a high of 35, so we are well under the 50person limit allowed for our sanctuary by the current guidelines.

By the time you receive this, we expect to have returned to the sanctuary for worship services, with the same masks and social-distancing by person/family.

The back windows will be open, so additional seating will be available in Memorial Hall. We will be leaving a row empty between groups and will continue to have only one hymn and music by the



Minister of Music or a substitute. There will be no greeters and the offering plate will be at the entrance to the sanctuary. Services will continue to be 30 minutes so they can be taped for the website. Prior to the move, a new ventilation system has been donated and will be installed in the sanctuary to assure safer air quality in the sanctuary. I do hope more of you will feel safe in attending our in-person services.

A reminder to those in our Church Family who do not get to see the monthly calendar: we will have our traditional Thanksgiving Eve service November 25th at 6PM, followed by the holiday decorating on November 28th at 9AM, as Advent I is November 29th.

This will be my last message to you as Council President, as I will not be a Council member in 2021. I have served in several positions during my many years in our Church family and could have taken

another office. However, I sincerely feel it is time for younger folks to meet the challenges that this church faces now and in the future. We are fortunate to have talented younger people in our Church Family who are willing to serve. Blessings to all, Glenna Jordan, President



Missions & Benevolence:

The Benevolence Fund continues to make a \$25 monthly contribution to the China Food Pantry; we've received no requests for additional assistance related to the pandemic. Since we no longer provide families with Thanksgiving baskets, we do have a budgeted expense to make a \$100 donation to the Food Pantry to help with the holiday baskets they provide. Unless I receive negative comments regarding this, I will plan to make the donation.

As usual, I'm reminding people to please support PDF (Pastor's Discretionary Fund) offerings on the months that have a 5th Sunday (November 29 and January 31), as these and other cash donations enable Pastor Paul to meet the emergency requests that he receives without asking the congregation for special donations. The aid requests he has received since our last newsletter were for helping a family with medical expenses and two other families with fuel expenses. Thanks to those who made special cash donations, as well as PDF donations that allowed Pastor Paul to meet these requests.

Again, a very special "thankyou" to Susie, who provides delicious baked goods left over from her Farmer's Market baking. Our share of the donations is added to Pastor Paul's PDF account and is available when he gets calls. Incidentally, because of the requests for assistance, the PDF account would be over-budget if not for the proceeds donated from Susie's food contributions.

Advent Season is ahead of us and you will be kept informed of any families who are referred to Pastor Paul for our gift giving.

This will be my last message to you as Chair of the Benevolence Committee. Per our by-laws, I am termed-out of office, having served six years of my own, plus completing Churchill's term and Bob Scarduzzio's term a few years back. I am pleased to tell you that, if elected at the January Annual Meeting, Patrick Vigue has agreed to chair this Committee. I know he would be an excellent leader and hope he has your support. To help Patrick in this new office, Marge Kurtzman, Lindsey Harwath and I have offered to continue serving on the Benevolence Committee.

Please let Pastor Paul or me know of anyone needing emergency assistance. Thanks again for your sharing and caring and "God Bless". - Glenna Jordan, Deacon/ Benevolence Chair



Finance & Stewardship:

Happy Fall! Our church finances continue to do well thanks to the unbudgeted donation of \$10,000 earlier in the year. Our budgeted actual revenue for the year to date is \$49,848. This is approximately \$11,000 behind what we had projected for revenue as of the end of October and is mainly due to the shortfalls in projected loose offerings and fundraisers.

Our expenses to date total \$58,435; without the \$10,000 our expenses exceed revenue by \$8,587. With this generous gift, we are at a \$1,413 surplus for the year to date.

Building & Grounds:

In preparation for worship's return to the sanctuary, we have updated our sanctuary with an air removal system. A 500-cubic foot per minute fan has been installed to remove the air from the sanctuary in approximately 15 minutes. This will allow us to safely meet in the sanctuary without the need to open windows... a necessary step in Maine in winter (3)

This one-way movement of air is not just a defense against COVID. Next summer, this system should prove very cooling as it will draw out all the heat that usually makes us miserable. We have an air conditioning unit that is almost big enough for the sanctuary and this removal of hot air should make that unit's job easier.

Spring cleaning will have to accomplish some traditionally fall outside tasks next year as our current focus has been inside, with the major renovation in Memorial Hall and now the air system upgrade.

My thanks to the anonymous donors who paid for the air system for the sanctuary. I am always grateful for God's provision through His people for the needs of His church. - Regards, Ron Maxwell, Chair

Worship Committee:

Here I go - writing my last newsletter article as Chair of the Worship Committee. The final year of my second term is ending, and I will be going off the Council in January.

My first news: the price of sponsoring the bulletin for one month has been reduced to \$20. Please consider this as a way to honor a loved one and support the church. A message of remembrance or honor will be printed in the bulletin each week for the sponsored month. The sign-up sheet

is in Memorial Hall and all months except December are available in 2021.

Will we be worshipping in the sanctuary when you receive this letter? I am hopeful, but recent surges in virus numbers make me unsure. I feel Memorial Hall has served us well, and we are so blessed to have this big open space in



which to worship together. Please keep in mind that, as we return, we will still have to wear mandated face covering and practice social distancing. This is not

easy to do, but is what we need do to protect everyone.

The return to the sanctuary comes as we start our new church year, which begins with Advent, starting on November 29 this year. At SCCC, we follow the Revised Common Lectionary with prescribed readings each Sunday. It runs in threeyear cycles: Gospel readings in the first year (Year A) are taken primarily from the Gospel of Matthew; those in the second year (Year B), from the Gospel of Mark; and those in the third year (Year C), from the Gospel of Luke. Readings from John appear in special seasons throughout the year. We are just finishing Year A of the cycle and will be starting Year B at the beginning of Advent.

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to serve as Elder of Worship. It has been a very rewarding experience! I have learned much about all the work that is required for the operation of our church, have been honored to serve communion, assist with the work of the church, and have had much fun meeting with the Worship Committee and selecting music.
