Finance & Stewardship:

As anticipated, our revenue for the year to date as of the end of February is less than

our expenses. As of February 28, 2022, our budgeted actual revenue for the year to date is \$8,440.98. Our expenses as of



February 28, 2022 total \$10,977.65 for a shortfall for the first two months of the year of \$2,536.67. Our budgeted revenue of \$8,440.98 is \$5,560.56 less than anticipated, primarily due to less than needed fundraising & offerings revenue. Our 2022 budget has an expected offerings shortfall, so our deficit to date was anticipated.

In April, we will be closing out our three annuities at the end of their five-year terms. For the time being, those monies will be deposited into bank accounts until we decide how best to invest them.

Building & Grounds:

There are no big projects planned until spring yard work, but we will be cleaning up downstairs before kids return to Sunday School. I'd like to utilize the closet for cleaning supplies & build shelves in the craft room. In addition, Ian will review the music files as a lot of them date back to the 1960s-1970s.

The lack of heat on February 6 was an "easy fix" because we had run out of propane.

Sheldon & I cut the feed in case there was a system malfunction. The tank was subsequently topped with 440 gallons & we're now on automatic delivery. I've lowered thermostats to 60°

for now, except for the sanctuary which will be at 70° for services, but we should try to reduce our use as weather gets warmer & closely monitor expenses. I will be checking for air leaks under the sanctuary in the near future to address any loss of heat. – Regards, Ron Maxwell, Deacon Building & Grounds

*Pastor Jim served at South China Community Church from 1994 until his retirement in late 2011. A memorial service will be held at SCCC in May. Bedtime prayer can be a meaningful way to spend time with God every evening, talking over your day, sharing your concerns with Him, & thanking Him for His love & care. But why should we take

time to pray before bed each night?

Praying as you fall asleep gives you the chance to look back over the day & thank God for His help & His blessings. We often miss the hand of God in our lives as we run from one activity to another. We lose sight of the good gifts our heavenly Father is giving us (<u>James 1:17</u>) & focus instead on our troubles & worries.

Scripture tells us to "fix our eyes on Jesus" so that we do not "grow weary & lose heart (Hebrews 12:2-3). Whether life feels overwhelming or dull, a time of prayer at the end of each day can help you refocus on God's goodness & reflect on your priorities & purpose (Matthew 28:19-20).

Relationships flourish when they are nurtured. Spending time talking with God before bed is a way of loving Him & deepening your relationship with Him. The evening is a lonely part of the day for many people. Choosing to pray before bed each night means that you can look forward to enjoying time with One whose love for you is deep (Ephesians 3:18-19) & constant (Romans 8:37-39).

Redeem the time you lie in bed waiting for sleep to come. If your mind is a blank, worries & temptations will creep in to fill it. Pain that was background noise during your busy day can blare like a siren when you are lying in the quiet & the dark. Reaching for your phone to distract you will only keep you awake. Rehashing conversations & running the numbers will only feed your anxiety.

Instead, release your worries & the pressures of the day by taking them to the One who has the power to help you & give you peace. A: Hip hop


