Did you know....

The first American Christmas tree can be credited to a Hessian soldier who was captured at the Battle of Bennington (VT) in 1776. He later went to work on a farm in Windsor Locks, CT & for 14 years put up & decorated Christmas trees in the family's home.

The first Christmas tree retail lot was established in 1851 by Pennsylvanian Mark Carr, who hauled ox sleds loaded with trees from the Catskill Mtns. to the sidewalks of New York City.

On December 22, 1882, Edward Johnson, an associate of Thomas Edison, created the first string of Christmas lights, which were sold in New York City.

The first president to set up a Christmas tree in the White House was Franklin Pierce in 1859.

The first president to establish the National Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony on the White House lawn was Calvin Coolidge.

In 1895, Grover & Frances Cleveland were the first to use electric Christmas lights on a presidential tree (candles were used previously). *Please e-mail or speak to me or a Council member with any tidbits you have for...
