President's Report:

Angels-Who Are They?

Angels have been around forever, acting as messengers for God. In Genesis 16, an angel tells Hagar to return to Sarai & submit to her, adding that she (Hagar) will bear a son for Abram. Judges 6 describes the plight of Gideon, who desperately wanted to save the Israelites from the Midianites. God sent a prophet, also described as "the angel of the Lord" & "the angel of God." Gideon addressed him as Lord & asked for signs of his authority. Of course, God saved the Israelites. In 1 an angel touched Eliiah convinced him to eat & drink before continuing on his journey to Horeb. God sent an angel to destroy Jerusalem (1 Chronicles, Ch. 21), but had mercy & ordered the angel to stop.

The angel Gabriel interpreted Daniel's visions; he (the angel) was "one who looked like a man" (Daniel 8:15). A king was coming to destroy, but that king would ultimately be destroyed. The same angel would go on to announce the births of John & Jesus.

Angels appeared in physical form, offering advice, wisdom, news & help, directed by God. In my Bible



they are defined as "an order of heavenly, supernatural beings created by God for his purposes" (p. 1992, <u>Women of Faith Study Bible-NIV</u>, Zondervan, 2001). Once

Jesus went home to Heaven, they took their place as subject to Him.

I would like to add a modern spin to this definition. Aren't there people in your circles who have saved you in one way or another? They care about you, give some advice, tell you something you need to know. Some may have even shared and/or interpreted the Word of God. There haven't been many requests for help in the last few months, but we need to think ahead to the winter months when there is always a greater need. Between the monthly breakfasts that have been well attended & the weekly donations for Susie's goodies, we are doing pretty well.

It won't be much longer & we will need to start thinking of the Christmas families. Please don't hesitate to let one of us know if you are aware of someone in need. It is our mission to help as many as possible.

Finance & Stewardship:

Greetings! I hope you all are having a nice summer filled with family visits, good food & many moments for your favorite pastimes. I have missed you, as I have been absent most of the summer, but I am still on top of the church finances.

As of July 31, SCCC expenses are at \$52,598.67, or 62% of our budget, which is a bit high, given that we are 58% of the way through the year. However, our revenue is also high at \$51,669.02, or 61%, so we are doing well, with expenses exceeding revenue by only \$929.65. Good job, everyone!

The area in which our expenses have exceeded budgeted amounts the most is Property Maintenance. Ron Maxwell has spent numerous hours getting our building up to par so we can find another company to insure our property. Rates have increased significantly & we are hoping to reduce that cost. Thank you, Ron, for all the time & effort you have put into repairs & improvements!

Weekly offerings average slightly over \$1000, which just meets our weekly

target. Thank you very much for your continued support.



Fundraising efforts have paid off well, with income from our breakfasts & Chicken BBQ exceeding expectations. On the other hand, we now have breakfast expenses since we are buying some food supplies instead of relying on the Kitchen Crew to pay out of their own pockets; but our revenue easily covers it.

We have made over \$4,000 in interest on our CD investments so far this year. Our Meader/Memorial CD matured in July & we reinvested the funds in two 11-month CDs at 4%. Separating the Meader & Memorial money will make it a lot easier to keep track of what's what. - Gratefully, Janet Preston, Finance Chair



Building & Grounds:

We remain insured through Church Mutual as criteria for the anticipated coverage with State Farm changed June 1st. Although frustrated & disappointed with what transpired, the building repairs needed to be done & will help us acquire a new carrier. Efforts to secure a new & less expensive insurance policy are ongoing.

Bob Webber has installed new bathroom windows & two of four others in Memorial Hall. Funds for the purchase of an air conditioner for the sanctuary (to help with heat & humidity) did not have to come from the Meader Fund as the cost was covered by an anonymous donor; a second AC will be bought for Memorial Hall later.

Some of you may have noticed that Pastor Paul is now ringing a small bell shortly after Mary begins to play introductory music to the service. It's an old tradition:

As early as 400 AD, handbells were used to call people to worship in Christian churches. After being introduced in France & Italy around 550, their use spread to Great Britain by monks & friars.

Bells are often rung to signify the start or conclusion of a time of prayer or quiet

reflection, but are also used during times of joy such as baptisms, Christmas, Easter, or on more solemn occasions, such as funerals, memorial services or on Good Friday.

The oldest church bells in the US are found in the Old North Church in Boston. They were cast in England in 1744, brought to the colonies & hung in the church in 1745. Although they were intended to ring for the glory of the British Empire, we all know Paul Revere rang them during his midnight ride in 1775 to warn colonists of advancing British troops. (FYI, Revere started his own bell foundry in 1792 & cast over 400 bells before his death in 1818.

SCCC used to have a bell choir & in fact, the bell Pastor Paul is ringing now, is inscribed with the name "Rev. David Van Strien," who served at our church from 1962 - 1980. In looking at our history, I discovered he sent the first newsletters to members & friends in 1966; in 1975, he & his wife gifted the church the stained-glass window in the front of the meeting room. In addition, the painting of Rev. Van Strien, painted by Christa Pauley, was commissioned by Floyd & Glenna Jordan in 1982. Quite a bit of interesting info!
